# Hungry and Homeless

CHILDREN IN OUR COMMUNITY

On Sunday, March 6, I watched Scott Pelley's report on *60 Minutes* about homeless children in Seminole County, Florida. The situation there duplicates the situation here in Guilford County and in so many parts of the United States. According to the *60 Minutes*' report, the estimated poverty rate for kids in this country will soon hit 25 percent, the worst level since the Great Depression!

Partners Ending Homelessness, a collaborative partnership committed to a long-term regional approach to ending homelessness, reported that in 2010 Guilford County had over 4,904 individuals who experienced homelessness. During the same year, 1,717 school-aged children experienced homelessness.

There is no reason we cannot end homelessness for our children! I invite you to work with us at Greensboro Urban Ministry and with the many other agencies and groups represented by Partners Ending Homelessness to bring that vision to reality. We have developed a plan to end homelessness. Over 200 communities around the country have developed plans to do the same. We just need the will and resources to carry it out! ## Mary's Story

GRACE COMMUNITY  
WINTER EMERGENCY (WE!)

Mary Warren and Angelo Brunson were both homeless on December 15, 2008.



The afternoon before Mary came to the Grace Community Winter Emergency (WE!) shelter for women, she had interviewed for a Certified Nursing Assistant job in a nursing home. The person interviewing her stated that she looked awful and "what was she, homeless or something?" When Mary came into Grace's WE! shelter she immediately knelt down beside her bed and thanked God for a safe place to stay. She was the only resident that year to have perfect attendance at the shelter, the first to get a job and the first to get housing on her own without public assistance.

Mary met Angelo, who was a resident at the West Market Street United Methodist Church (WE!) shelter for men. Angelo was also employed when he left the shelter and still holds that job today. Mary and Angelo's friendship grew during the winter and by the time the shelters closed they had begun to plan a life together.

They became engaged in 2009 and Grace Community WE! shelter was one of the first places that she shared her engagement. When the time came to plan a wedding, they had assumed that they would have to get married at the Justice of the Peace for financial reasons. When she shared this with her many friends at Grace, the answer was immediately, "No, you must get married with your family present!"

Mary and Angelo began marriage counseling with Will Dungee, one of the ministers at Grace. They were married on November 27, 2010 at Grace with their families and friends present.

# Volunteer Opportunities

## BEYOND PATHWAYS

Volunteers to help formerly homeless families move into their new homes when they leave Pathways and provide Welcome Home Kits for families.

## EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

Volunteers to interview people requesting emergency food or financial assistance. The desired commitment is a semester or 6 months with a four-hour shift per week. Training provided.

Volunteers to serve as telephone receptionists responding to calls asking about how to apply for emergency food or financial assistance. Volunteers will need to be able to relate to people in crisis situations.

Screeners and interviewers for those seeking financial assistance.

## CLOTHING BANK

Volunteers to help clients locate items and to sort and receive clothing donations, especially on weekday afternoons. Minimum 2 hour commitment is required.

## PARTNERSHIP VILLAGE

Individuals to help with tutoring/mentoring school age children on Tuesdays/Thursdays from 3:30pm-5:00pm. A 6 month or semester commitment is required.

Groups to provide activities with the children or with the parents in the community room.

Groups to provide a meal at 6:30pm or a weekend brunch. Eating utensils provided. Coffee pots and stove available.

The deposits are in, the money counted, and we have a total....The 30th Anniversary Greater Greensboro CROP Hunger Walk was a resounding success, raising \$220,000 to fight hunger locally and globally – a nearly \$30,000 increase over the previous year! And this total currently positions Greensboro's walk as the largest CROP Hunger Walk in the nation for the first time in our 30 year history!

The Greensboro community has always shown their support for hunger-fighting initiatives, but the outpouring of support for the 30th Anniversary was exceptional.
